- **Faith is a Legacy:** Abram's obedience impacted generations, ultimately leading to Jesus.

1. What is God asking you to step away from or leave behind?
2. In what areas of your life are you waiting to "see" before you act?
3. Have you ever obeyed God without knowing all the details? What happened?
4. Are there "comfort zones" in your life that are keeping you from living out your faith fully?
5. What promises from God are you holding onto today?

- ✓ Write down one area where you feel God prompting you to trust Him more.
- ✓ Take one small step this week toward that area of obedience.
- ✓ Build a "faith altar" — write a prayer or place a reminder in your home where you will trust God's promise daily.
- ✓ Share with a friend or accountability partner what you're learning through Abram's example.
