Focus Verse: "Set your minds on things above, not on earthly things." – Colossians 3:2

Overview of Study

Key Points

- Despite being surrounded by idolatry, Jacob remained faithful.
- He made a vow to tithe and honor God upon his return, and he fulfilled it.

3. Jacob Waited Patiently for God's Will

- He worked 20 years before returning home, trusting God's timing.
- He endured deception and delay without losing faith.

4. Jacob Maintained Integrity Despite Mistreatment

- Laban cheated him repeatedly, yet Jacob responded with honesty.
- He remained obedient to God's will, regardless of how others acted.

Reflective Questions

What does Jacob's story teach me about God's timing and delays in my life?

- Have I ever chosen urgency over spiritual significance? What was the result?
- Am I remaining faithful in a place or season I don't understand?
- In what ways am I tempted to compromise when others treat me unfairly?
- What commitment have I made to God—and have I followed through?

Action Steps

1. Evaluate Your Focus

Write down three things that are currently taking up most of your energy. Are they urgent, or important?

2. Practice Patience

Identify one area where you're waiting on God. Commit to trusting His timeline this week.

3. Honor God with Integrity

Choose to do what's right this week, even if others around you don't.

4. Tithe Your Time

Dedicate 10% of your time this week to intentional worship, prayer, or service.

Jacob wasn't perfect—but he was faithful. His life reminds us that God uses those who stay the course, honor His word, and trust in His plan.
