Overview of Study:

o From the palace to the pastures, Moses' 80 years of preparation taught him humility, leadership, and dependency on God.

4. Faith in Action Led to Deliverance

Moses' faithful obedience made a way for Israel's deliverance. His story reminds us that God moves through those who listen, believe, and obey.

Reflective Questions:

- 1. What worldly treasures or comforts am I tempted to hold onto instead of following God's will?
- 2. Have I ever felt like God's instructions didn't make sense? How did I respond?
- 3. What season in my life has God used to teach me humility and prepare me for something greater?
- 4. Am I growing closer to God daily—or settling for spiritual stagnation?
- 5. What area of my life do I need to fully surrender so that God can use me?

Action Steps:

- 1. **Identify one area** where you are tempted to choose comfort over obedience—write it down and commit it to prayer this week.
- 2. **Practice trust**: Choose one thing God has asked of you (through Scripture, prayer, or conviction) and take a step of faith, even if you don't fully understand it.
- 3. **Reflect daily** on how God may be shaping you through current challenges. Journal any moments where He reveals purpose in your preparation.
- 4. **Share your story**: Encourage someone else by telling them how God has worked in your life during uncertain or difficult seasons.

Conclusion:

Moses' life reminds us that being a hero of faith doesn't require perfection—it requires surrender. He chose God's path over Pharaoh's riches. He obeyed when it didn't make sense.
